Film-makers from different countries have often used film to bring political and social issues to wider public attention and to make veiled, often allegorical criticism of oppressive regimes. We will look at examples of films that depict the interaction within and between classes, groups and communities and address issues of social harmony, tension, repression, political oppression and conflict.

(5) Trial wording of new section of Constitution. (6) The referendum question. (7) Countering the arguments of the naysayers.
